She said there are a couple of women who cannot come to their sessions so they quilt or knot at home.

The volunteers range in age from 30 to 93 and come from various churches and as far away as Meyersdale.

She said they operate the two organizations entirely on donations.

"God provides," she said.

"It's a wonderful ministry, and we all have a good time."
